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2016/2017 School Year Begins August 22nd, 2016 What an incredible school year this has been! As the year began, I could never have expected all of the great things that have occurred at Foothill this year. Of course, we remember our Epic fundraiser, and how through the combined efforts of our PTA, parents, teachers, local businesses, and Alpine School District we were able to raise more than \$360,000 to enhance student learning through technology and STEAM. This coming school year, this grant will allow us to have enough technology for a two student to every one-device ratio. This technology will not replace or remove any of the rich learning for students that has always occurred at Foothill, rather, will build upon great instruction to enhance students' learning opportunities.

We are proud to be a STEAM school! Our district has designated Foothill as a pilot school for the entire district because of the rich instruction provided for students to think and learn more deeply through STEAM. We are also excited that we received the state designation as a STEM school. Our purpose in being a STEAM school is to engage our students even more and to help them learn and be creative problem solvers. We are happy that our efforts have attracted multiple visitors to learn from the great things we are doing at our school, much like we have visited other schools to learn from their experiences. We were happy to have Alpine School District school board, superintendent, and cabinet visit Foothill; BYU and UVU professors and dean; local business owners; the Utah STEM Principal's Academy; and others. Our efforts at Foothill with STEAM will be implemented into seven neighboring elementary schools that feed into Orem and Timpanogos High Schools this coming school year.

Our theme this school year has been, "Leaving a Legacy." We have seen many clear examples of legacy leaving this school year. Our wonderful PTA has provided thousands of volunteer hours and has left a legacy that will be remembered for years to come. They made our Epic technology grant not only a possibility, but also a reality, while carrying on their many services to the school ranging from our Epic Fall Festival, to the astounding art and music programs, to the many extracurricular activities they provide. Our teachers, the heroes of our school, provide rich daily instruction for our students while providing a nurturing, positive environment for our students day after day. We could never thank our phenomenal teachers enough. They are the heart and strength of Foothill. We have also seen many examples of leaving a legacy from our wonderful students. We are proud of their achievements, for spreading sunshine through their childlike happiness, and their daily acts of kindness.

I am grateful to be the principal at Foothill Elementary. It is truly an honor to work with such wonderful parents, teachers, and students. TEN WEEKS:

Hold up their heads, look at objects, and begin to coo.

SIX MONTHS:

Roll over, babble, and grasp objects.

NINE MONTHS:

Begin to crawl, sit alone, and start eating finger foods.

ONE YEAR

Take first steps, point or wave, and say several words.

TWO YEARS:

Run and use two to three word sentences.

I can't believe we are almost done with another school year!!!!!

This time of year I always like to share as a reminder some summer safety information.

HERE ARE SEVEN SUMMER SAFETY TIPS!!!!

- 1. Apply sunscreen with SPF 15 or greater to reduce the intensity of ultra violet rays that cause sunburns. Apply it 15-30 minutes before sun exposure. Reapply sunscreen every two hours or after swimming or sweating. Stay in the shade whenever possible. Limit sun exposure during the peak intensity hours between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.
- 2. Drink plenty of water and fluids when you go outside to avoid dehydration.
- 3. Take time to ensure that outdoor play areas are safe, including play areas around your homes. This protects children from injuries in their own backyard.
- 4. When you are out on the trail, whether hiking, camping, or hunting, protect yourself from mosquitoes and other bugs by using insect and tick repellent.
- 5. Drowning is the second leading cause of death among Utah children under the age of 14. Water accidents are also a major cause of life-altering brain injuries every year. There's simply no substitute for 100% supervision. Watch your children at all times whenever they're around water.

REMEMBER: DON'T JUST BE THERE, BE AWARE!!!!

- 6. Boating safety includes: children should wear life jackets at all times when on boats, docks, or near bodies of water. Make sure the life jacket is the right size for your child. The jacket should not be loose and should always be worn as instructed with all straps belted. Blow-up water wings, toys, rafts, and air mattresses should not be used as life jackets or personal flotation devices. ADULTS SHOULD WEAR LIFE JACKETS FOR THEIR OWN PROTECTION AND TO SET A GOOD EXAMPLE!!!
- 7. Infants and small children are not able to regulate their body temperature in the same way that adults do. Every year, children die from heat stroke from being left in a hot car, often unintentionally, with the majority of these deaths occurring in children 3 and under. Always check the back seat to make sure all children are out of the car when you arrive at your destination. Place your cell phone, bag, or purse in the back seat, so you are reminded to check the back seat when you arrive at your destination.

Dear Parents:

Many parents do not recognize the early signs of a critical health issue: communication disorders. Speech, language, and hearing disorders are among the most common disabilities in the United States. This month, during the national observance of Better Hearing and Speech Month, we encourage parents to take stock of their child's communication health. Sometimes, problems achieving academically, or social or behavioral issues in school, may be the result of an undiagnosed speech or hearing disorder. It is important for parents to be attuned to the early warning signs of these conditions.

The American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA), through its Identify the Signs campaign, offers many resources to help parents learn about these disorders. Visit http://identifythesigns.org to learn more about what to watch for and treatment options.

Prevention, especially when it comes to noise-induced hearing loss, is of growing importance with skyrocketing use of personal audio technology among kids. Many children have access to smartphones, tablets, and other devices—and use these with accompanying headphones or ear buds at high volumes (and for long periods of time). One in 5 kids ages 12–19 is suffering from hearing loss, an increase of 31% since the late 1980s/early 1990s. Year-round, but especially as we move into the summer months with increased leisure time, it is important to impart safe listening habits to your children. These include listening at half volume and taking listening breaks. It is also key to demonstrate this behavior—practice what you preach.
