principal's message Dr. Joseph Backman

This school year marks our fourth year of pursuing STEM/STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Mathematics). We have learned a lot along the way and have been pleased with the results. I would like to share a brief overview of our STEAM journey.

- 2013-2014 School Year: Started learning about STEM
 - o PTA provided engineering kits from Engineering is Elementary.
 - o Dr. Shumway, BYU Engineering and Technology professor and STEM expert, began working with our faculty. He taught us the basics of STEM and the Engineering Design Process: a hands-on, minds-on approach to learning.
 - o Partnership with Moxtek began, which inspired us to partner with other businesses.
- 2014-2015 School Year: STEM and the Engineering Design Process
 - o Teachers received 4 days of professional development with Dr. Shumway to learn more engineering tasks to implement into their classrooms.
 - o Dr. Shumway continued to work with teams and our faculty on creating and implementing Engineering Design tasks. Teams visited Dr. Shumway's BYU lab.
- 2015-2016 School Year: STEAM integration

- o Foothill received an Epic Grant from the Pedersen family that was matched by Alpine School District, local businesses, grants written by our teachers, and many Foothill families. This grant has brought our school to 1 iPad for every 2 students in each classroom and Chromebooks into our 3-6th grade classrooms. o School visits from Alpine District School Board and cabinet members, BYU and UVU professors and dean, state legislators and administrators, and local schools. o Foothill received the official Utah STEM designation (1 of 19 schools in the state). o School STEAM presentation to Governor Herbert and his Education Commission.

Foothill hosted the summer trainings and our teachers helped provide the professional development. o Dr. Amy Miner, BYU professor and integration expert, has worked with our teachers to help integrate STEAM principles in the arts and all subject areas. o Throughout this school year, teams will have multiple opportunities to collaborate with their grade-level teams at the other Apollo Project schools. o As a pilot school for Alpine School District, we have Renee Wakamatsu serving as our full-time instructional coach as support to all of our teachers. o The Foothill Exploratorium began where engineering and STEAM integration happen with Shauna Crockett as our Technology Integrationist. o We received the Beverly Taylor Sorenson grant to bring Caitlin Hall, our art

Why do these events and accomplishments matter? They have equipped our already amazing teachers with tools and instruction to further deepen student learning. The results on our assessments indicate that the majority of our students are achieving at high levels and we are moving our students to much higher levels of proficiency when compared to other schools in the district and state. Opportunities for the Timpanogos Storytelling Festival

1. Patriotic Storytelling Contest with Cash Prizes (Due Date November 14)

Timpanogos Storytelling is proud to partner with America's Freedom Festival in Provo to offer the opportunity for K-12 students to compete for cash prizes. Contestants are invited to submit short pieces via YouTube (1-3 minute stories for grades K-9 and 3-5 minute stories for grades 10-12) related to the 2016 theme of "Freedom" online by November 14, 2016. Winners will be notified by January 9, 2017 and receive cash prizes (\$75 for grades K-6, \$100

for grades 7-9, and \$250 for grades 10-12). Click <u>here</u> for submission links and additional details. Since applications are accepted online, this is a great opportunity for students no matter where they are from in the state.

2. National Youth Storytelling Showcase Submissions (Due Date February 3)

Ten youth from around the nation are selected each year as National Torchbearers. They attend the Timpanogos Storytelling Conference and Festival for free, learning more about storytelling from professional storytellers and perform during the events. 3. Timpanogos Storytelling Festival Youth Auditions (Due Date Early March)

Over twenty Utah students perform onstage with professional storytellers throughout the week of the Timpanogos Storytelling Festival. We will send out further information on how to get involved in 2017, but we wanted to make sure teachers knew about this opportunity in case they have a student they think would be interested in participating.

NURSING NEWS NOVEMBER 2016

"Influenza" is a contagious disease that spreads around the United States every year usually between October and May. Different influenza viruses occur each year. The flu vaccination you received last year WILL NOT protect you from the influenza viruses THIS YEAR! EVERY FLU SEASON IS DIFFERENT!

ANYONE can get the flu. Flu strikes suddenly and can last several days. Flu is most dangerous for infants and young children, people 65 years and older, pregnant women, and those with weakened immune systems.

ALL people who DON'T have an allergy to the vaccine should be vaccinated. People with a history of a neurological disorder, Guillian-Barre Syndrome should not get this vaccine.

It takes about 2 weeks for protection to develop after vaccination. A dose of the flu vaccine is recommended EVERY flu season. The best time to receive the vaccine is at the beginning of the flu season.

Each year thousands of people in the U.S. die from the flu and many more get hospitalized. The flu vaccine can keep you from getting the flu, make flu less severe if you do get it, and keep you from spreading flu to your family and other people.

THE BEST WAYS TO STOP THE SPREAD OF INFLUENZA ARE:

- -GET YOUR VACCINE.
- -WASH HANDS FREQUENTLY
- -PRACTICE COUGH AND SNEEZE ETIQUETTE
- -AVOID TOUCHING YOUR EYES, NOSE, OR MOUTH
- -CONTACT YOUR HEALTHCARE PROVIDER WITHIN 48 HOURS IF ILLNESS DEVELOPS.
- -STAY HOME WHEN III.

There are many immunization clinics being held in Alpine School District. Check with your student's schools or check the Alpine District website for dates, times, and locations of these immunization clinics!


