
North Point's Extended Day Model


North Point's Extended Day Model focuses on a philosophy of teaming. Each teacher's class is divided into two tracks. The early track attends school from 8:00 until 2:15 and the later track attends from 9:15 until 3:30. The greatest advantage our model offers is a block of time every day from 8:00 until 9:15 and again from 2:15 until 3:30, when teachers have very small classes. We are very protective of this "Small Group Instruction Time" and consider it the most important time of the day.

During this period there are no interruptions to instruction: no recess, no announcements, no assemblies, or gym. NO Interruptions! Please help us protect this valuable instructional time by not calling to speak with teachers or students during this time. With this uninterrupted time and small class sizes, teachers are able to focus on improving student skills in math, reading and writing.

ABOUT OUR SCHOOL

North Point Elementary opened its door for the first time to students in 2009. Our school is now in its 6th year of operation. North Point has 34 regular education and 6 special use classrooms. We have 13 additional portable classrooms. We have a campus of 13 acres.

2014-15 Trustlands Plan

Goal # 1 (K-2 Reading)

Our goal is to have 90% of K-2 students reaching 2015 Winter DRA benchmark.

We will spend the following Trustlands Expenditures to achieve our goal.

- ⇒ We will pay our 1st and 2nd grade teachers 10 hours each to give the DRA to their students before school starts in August. (August 11-13, 2014) \$2,625.00
- ⇒ We will hire an aide to run and maintain our Home Reading Library. \$2,000.00.
- ⇒ We will hire DOUBLE DOSE aides to work 5 hours per day to help our DOUBLE DOSE TEACHERS provide Tier II reading interventions for K-2 students. \$4,500.00 + \$3.600.00 matching District Funds.
- ⇒ We will place three Kindergarten teachers on the Modified Extended Day Model to allow for small group instruction time for our Kindergarten students from 8:00 until 9:15 and from 10:45 until 12:00. \$22.111.00
- ⇒ We will hire 3 teachers to plan, recruit, and instruct a <u>Summer Jump Start Program</u> for students about to enter 1st, 2nd & 3rd grades. This 10 day program will have 15 students per class and will take place from July 28th through August 8th. \$3,000.00
- ⇒ We will purchase additional Guided Reading Books (Levels J-L) for our 1st grade teachers to supplement their classroom libraries that are lacking books for the new higher reading benchmarks. \$2,600.00
- We will purchase additional books for our Home Reading Library. \$1,500.00.

Goal #2 (3-6 Literacy)

Our goal is to have 80% of our students reach proficiency level in Language Art/Writing as measured by the new State SAGE Assessments.

We will spend the following Trustlands Expenditures to achieve our goal.

- ⇒ We will pay for teachers to attend Literacy Conferences and Conventions during the 2014-2015 school year. \$1,000.00.
- ⇒ We will pay for substitute teachers that will allow teachers to attend professional development conferences and conventions. \$300.00
- ⇒ We will purchase Chrome Books for our 4th grade students to use to improve keyboarding and writing skills. \$15,668.00.
- ⇒ We will purchase Close Reading Books for our 6th grade teachers to use during Small Group Literacy Instruction Time. \$1.575.00
- ⇒ We will hire DOUBLE DOSE aides to work 5 hours per day to help our DOUBLE DOSE TEACHERS provide Tier II reading and math interventions for 3-6th grade students. \$4,500.00 + \$3,600.00 matching District Funds.
- ⇒ We will provide Summer Collaboration Grants for teacher to have additional training and DRA assessment standards. \$4,000.00
- ⇒ We will purchase additional books for our Guided Reading Library (Levels M-P). \$3,000.00.
